As a service-oriented business, teaching tennis promises full days while developing both talent and recreational opportunities for both young and old. Recent developments in the sport sciences, sport psychology, nutrition, motor learning, biomechanics, racquet technology and fitness principles have led to an increased need for formal education to maintain a truly qualified status as a tennis professional. Head tennis professionals administer tournaments, run leagues, hire staff, organize socials, and teach both group and private lessons.

Entry Level Position: \$30,000 - \$35,000 per year

Head Professional: \$35,000 - \$50,000 per year

The need for qualified people who can teach lessons, manage professional shops, and manage club facilities will always be in high demand. Over 90 percent of the graduates in the tennis teaching program at Tyler Junior College find full-time tennis employment, in many cases, before they graduate.
